Hello everyone. With the summer RE classes coasting along, there's been some free time for me to look at the larger picture of "What needs to be done in the next few weeks?" Lots of changes and improvements will be happening in the near future, including:

- improving the RE content on our website;
- more family-friendly events, including a monthly family potluck with activities for kids;
- reorganizing the age groups in the RE program to work better for the ages of our kids;
- rescheduling the youth group to be concurrent with church rather than meeting from noon-2 p.m.;

SUUC Service Project at Food Lifeline

I am loving my new name, Laura FoodBanks. Thanks again Lukas and Kristina. On July 19, six people from our church reprocessed canned salmon—over 5,000 meals in one evening. It was one of the easiest jobs we have ever had because almost every can was perfect and just needed a label saying it was canned salmon and put back in the boxes for sending on to the food banks.

As part of hunger action advocacy, I worked at the North End Food Bank in Lake City passing out food. Very interesting—I got to give away as many heads of lettuce as people would take (because it was going bad) and one head of cabbage per family. I talked with one of the recipients who is a checker (for at least 10 years) at Central Market (would you ever think a grocery checker could need food from a food bank?!) and her hours had been drastically cut by a new manager. She is only now getting back up to her normal number of hours and in order to make ends meet, she gets help from the Food Bank. It is a tough economy and all the help you can give is greatly appreciated—food donations in the hallway boxes and the food reprocessing nights every third Tuesday of the month.

Caring for Those with Mental Illnesses

From SUUC Addictions and Recovery Ministries Team

“People have responded to illness and healing for thousands of years by caring for each other in times of need. Modern science shows us that illnesses of the brain, including mental illness, are like other illnesses in many respects, and those with mental illness deserve our care just as those who are physically ill.

“ ‘Mental illness’ refers primarily to depression, bipolar disorder and schizophrenia. The symptoms of suffering include dramatic changes in a person’s mood, thinking, behavior and relationships. For much of human history, mental illness has been surrounded by myth and stigma. Sufferers have been feared, punished and isolated, and their families blamed or ignored. However, recent advances in medical knowledge and treatment offer new resources for healing and recovery, and the public perception of mental illness is changing.”
