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Minister's Message

Hello dear ones,

Today I write with a heavy heart as I have just learned about the murders in Charleston at the Emmanuel African Methodist Episcopal (AME) church. A historically significant church, Emmanuel was founded by an African-American preacher dedicated to making a church home for slaves. Active in the abolitionist movement and just as justice-focused today, the church is a symbol of black people refusing to be second class citizens in South Carolina, a state that still flies the confederate flag.



Why does this shooting matter? Yes, it is certainly a tragedy when nine people are shot and killed, people gathered to worship together. It is a tragedy when a young girl has to play dead to survive a brutal attack. But murders occur in our country every day, in huge metropolises and small towns. Why is this tragedy capturing so much of the public's attention?

In every social movement there is a point at which the oppressed have made so much progress that the oppressor feels threatened and retaliates. This happened after President Obama was elected, when there was an immediate surge of race-related hate crimes. Today, as the Black Lives Matter movement becomes main stream, the backlash has begun. People such as the Charleston gunman, who see the oppressed striving for justice, are eager to push them back down.

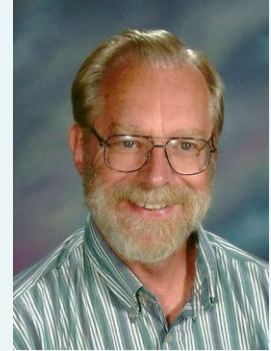
In 1963 the 16th Street Church in Birmingham, Alabama, was bombed by four white supremacists. Four little girls were killed that day. Former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was a few blocks away that morning, at her father's church. She wrote "That bomb took the lives of four young girls, including my friend and playmate [Carol] Denise McNair. The crime was calculated, not random. It was meant to suck the hope out of young lives, bury their aspirations, and ensure that old fears would be propelled forward into the next generation." The crime in Charleston had a similar aim, to bury the hopes of a generation insisting on just treatment by police officers and more opportunities for all people of color.

The 16th Street Church bombing galvanized a new breed of activists in this nation. White stay-at-home moms who didn't think the civil rights movement applied to them were horrified into action by the deaths of innocent children. African-Americans who were staying out of the movement for their own safety were emboldened by the senseless violence. Northerners who thought the movement was a southern thing realized that the death of children in a church made this situation bigger than geography, that racism pervaded the Mason-Dixon line.

My fellow spiritual companions on this journey of faith, it is time for the tragedy in Charleston to galvanize us, to push us out of our comfort zone, to insist that Black Lives Matter. This violence is not a southern thing, an east-coast event that in our pride we wish to deny could happen here. It is happening here, in the acts of inhumanity African-Americans face in Puget Sound. It is happening here in the gentrification of neighborhoods. It is happening here in the sub-par public schools where we send our city's African-American children to learn. It is happening here, even while we are undergoing a federal investigation of our police department's practices of excessive force and biased arrests. It's happening here, to our kids, to our neighbors, to our family members. Cry over the Charleston massacre, but when your tears have dried, join me in demanding a Puget Sound, a nation, that recognizes the Black Lives Matter. Talk to the people in your world about race, google "white privilege," and read the blog Colorlines. Learn how you can be an ally in the movement toward racial equality. We will not allow another generation of black children to grow up hopeless.

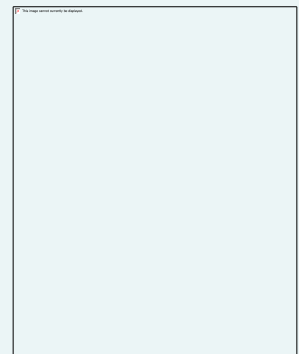

- "How much UU history is it important for children to know?"
- "How deep do we go in teaching the six sources?"
- "If many adults in the church don't know about an aspect of our faith, should children be expected to? Why?"

Working through these questions was not always easy, but it felt very meaningful for us to step back to grapple with these things. While we've finished our work too recently for me to present it to you all, I look forward to sharing it with you soon. More than I look forward to sharing it with you, I look forward to seeing how it changes and improves the way we do religious exploration with children and youth in our church! **Thanks to Adam**

Opening

Call to Order - Karen Thompson presiding.

New Business

Approval of SUUC May Board meeting minutes: Board unanimously approved.

Introduction of new Board Members: The returning board members were excited to welcome the newly elected board members to the team. They bring with them great energy and we as pleased to have them with us!

Assigning of Board positions: Karen Thompson agreed to remain president of the board. Paul Borrmann agreed to remain in his post as treasurer, and Adam Griffith agreed to continue as Secretary. Carolyn Threadgill offered to serve as Vice President. These appointments were approved unanimously.

Assigning of Liaison tasks: Juel Erikson will be the board Liaison to the Welcome Team. Amanda Ray will

be Liaison to the Music Committee and Religious Education. Adam Griffith will be Liaison to the Building and Grounds Committee. Karen Thomson will liaison with the Committee on Ministry and the Personnel Committee. Paul Borrmann will be Liaison to the Endowment Committee. Carolyn Threadgill will be Liaison to the Social Action Committee. Alison Lilly will be Liaison to the Nominating Committee and the Worship Planning Committee.

Leadership Retreat: The Board decided on the date of September 19th to have the Annual Board Leadership Retreat, assuming that a retreat leader will be available on that date.

Report from the Taskforce on Worship and Growth: This important taskforce is in the early stages of its work, and they will look at the issues of crowding in our growing congregation. Parking is becoming an issue, and an effort will be made to reach a deal with the church to the north of us, which holds worship on Saturdays. Input from other groups will be actively sought after, and the congregation will be encouraged to sit close together to leave open seats for families that come late.

Barbara Cornell: Work continues on creating a covenant with Barbara Cornell to outline her affiliation with SUUC, with plans to wrap it up in the next few months.

Rev. Kate's Compensation: The Board unanimously passed a motion supporting the Personnel Committee's desire to look over Kate's compensation package.

Pagan Interest Group: The Pagan Interest group approached the Board for support in becoming a member of CUUPS (Covenant of UU Pagans). Chris Doerksen ran through the pros and cons of the move, and Board voted unanimously to support and welcome the group to join CUUPS.

50th Anniversary is coming: Next year will be SUUC's 50th anniversary. A task force is being put together to create a celebration for this happy occasion.

Gathering Signatures for WA Initiative 735

Washington State Initiative 735 is a retry of last year's I-1329, which did not qualify for the ballot. It urges the WA State Legislature to support -- and Congress and the WA State Congressional delegation to enact -- an amendment to the U.S. Constitution stating that constitutional rights belong only to individuals and not corporations or associations; that spending money is not considered free speech under the First Amendment, that governments may regulate political contributions and expenditures, and that such contributions and expenditures must be disclosed to the public. Cheryl Whitcomb will be collecting signatures and recruiting other signature gatherers in the church entry hall after Sunday services. We will celebrate both the wedding of Rev. Kate and the wedding of Chris Pollina with an after-church reception in August. Watch for the announcements!



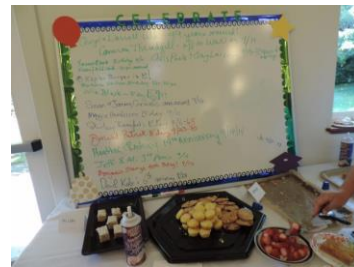
Fund Raising Success!!!

Appreciating Elderhood

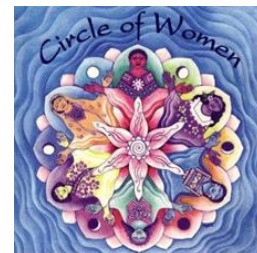

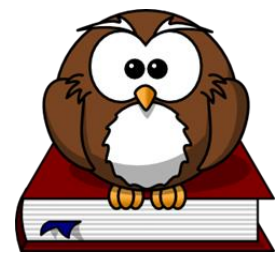
Hymn of the Month--July
