## MINISTER'S MESSAGE REV. KATE LANDIS

Dear Church Family,

Summertime and the living is exciting! It's just one month until Jay and I wed in southern Ohio. We can hardly wait to celebrate with our families in the hot Ohio sun. August brings the Unitarian Universalist's Eliot Institute Creative Arts Camp at Seabeck Conference Center, August 8-13. I am leading a workshop series on worship arts, and collaborating with the Rev. Amanda Aikman on daily worship services. Since the Creative Arts camp is only in its second year, there are still a few spots available, so join me at Seabeck for a banquet of arty fun by the sea. Even after autumn begins, the excitement continues, as our neighbor University Unitarian Church has invited our congregation to join them on a pilgrimage to Transylvania, a district of Romania, and I have accepted. Transylvania is the place where Unitarianism first flourished in Europe, and King John Sigismund of Transylvania was the world's first and only Unitarian king. King John issued the Edict of Religious Toleration in 1568, a visionary and almost unimaginably radical act for the time. The Edict proclaimed that subjects could worship as they saw fit, rather than requiring them to convert to the king's faith, as was the practice at the time. Unfortunately, King John's life was cut short by illness and his edict was overturned by his successor. Still, the edict inspired our own founding fathers to codify the freedom of religion we enjoy today.

The Unitarian faith continued to flourish after King John's death, and active congregations will host us both for worship and homestays while in Transylvania. I am ecstatic at this opportunity to connect with our faith's heritage and to preach in churches seven hundred years old. As our June theme is Legacy, I'll be reflecting both now and in Transylvania on what it means to come from this historic place, with this radical heritage.

I hope you'll join me in considering the theme of Legacy, and if possible even in Transylvania. Spots are available on the trip, talk to me for more information. Either way, let's enjoy an exciting summer and fall together.

## Money Talks— June 2015

### A Capital Idea!

With a unanimous vote at the Annual meeting to proceed to a capital campaign, six months or so from now we will come up with an answer to the question many of you have asked me: can we afford the new building we have said we need?

As I said at the Annual Meeting last month, we will need several large gifts in order to raise the \$500,000 estimated to bring the building within our financial reach. This summer I will leading an effort to locate those large gifts, and I'll ask some of you to join a few of us who want to establish a pool of "challenge match" funds – that is, funds that will match contributions of other congregants that exceed a base figure we will determine by the formal start of the campaign in September.

All of you will all be asked in the fall to decide how much you can pledge for the new building. You will be reminded (repeatedly) that this capital pledge cannot replace any part of your regular annual Stewardship pledge for the operating budget. We will expect your pledge to be paid within a three year period, as the financing for the building will be based on that expectation. You will be urged to pledge as much as you are able, but will also be urged NOT to base your pledge on a mere hope that your finances will improve. It is understood that some of you stretch each year to give what you do, and those will be able to contribute little to the capital campaign.

### New Business

**Approval of SUUC April Board meeting minutes**—Board unanimously approved.

**Preparing for the Congregational meeting**—The Board discussed the format and logistics of the May congregational meeting. Paul Borrmann supplied language for several motions to be put forward by the board during this meeting. The wording was unanimously supported.

**Change of meeting**—The board agreed to change the date of the June board meeting to Wednesday the 17th of June to accommodate people's schedules.

**Change of Healthcare Laws**—The board discussed a change in the way businesses must approach offering healthcare to their employees brought on by the Affordable Care Act. The new laws encourage us to try to get employees covered under the UUA group healthcare plan.

**Plate Share for Tent City**—The board unanimously supported the idea of asking the Plate Share team to consider doing a plate share for Tent City.

**Award for Reverend Kate!** The Board congratulates Reverend Kate on receiving the Merit award. It could not have gone to a more deserving person.

**Emergency Preparedness**—It was decided to finalize the emergency preparedness plan once the new board is in place.

### Old Business

**Barbara Cornell** - The Board continued discussing the details of arranging for Barbara Cornell to become a Minister Affiliated with SUUC. Barbara has spoken to Kate about the specific things she hopes to accomplish and work continues on this front.

## Child Dedication Time!



# RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

**CHRIS POLLINA – DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION**



In the process of creating a religious education mission statement for our church's children and youth, the RE Big Picture Team and I recently had a conversation which touched on an important issue. We came to the conclusion that one of the most important factors for children getting a high quality, comprehensive religious education is for them to be here on Sunday morning! While this may sound fairly self evident, it's a point that I don't often bring up outside of some occasional encouragement to attend more special services.

I recently came by a slim little volume entitled "Full Circle: Fifteen Ways to Grow Lifelong UUs" by Katie Tweedy Erslev. For this book, Erslev interviewed 82 life-long UUs to figure out what common threads are shared in them being grounded and fed by our faith tradition.

The third chapter is entitled "Share the Value of Attending Regularly, at Least Three Times a Month," and in it she explores how attending three or more times a month allows children (and adults) to "reap the full benefits of community." That phrase, "reap the full benefits" stuck with me, and made me realize that I may be hiding the light and potential of our church's RE program by shying away from explicitly encouraging regular attendance. I am loathe to seem negative, pushy, or demanding by saying how much anyone "should" attend. I know life is often complicated and busy for many of you and that sometimes getting to church on a Sunday morning can be difficult, even impossible; I get it. But while difficulties in making attending church a regular habit exist, there are also great rewards I feel remiss in not highlighting: a deeper understanding of our church's beliefs, a greater sense of community, a sense of commitment and responsibility to our faith, meaningful friendships that last a lifetime, a connection to the larger UU world, and a sense of having "spiritual tools" for life's inevitable hardships. So, it is in this spirit that I wholeheartedly encourage you to keep these benefits in mind and consider making regular attendance to church a spiritual practice for your family – I'd love to see what we can build and grow when more of our community is here in fellowship on Sunday mornings!

Of course, I know that many of you and your children are already making such an effort to be here regularly and want to recognize the contribution you make to the larger community by providing the continuity to our church which helps to foster community. I wanted to make a point of giving a special honor to the six children in grades K-8th who had an average attendance of three out of four Sundays over the last school year. Jessica, Jason, Jonah, Jasper, Jade, and Lukas; you rock! And so do your parents! =)

Finally, one last mention: on June 7 we'll be having a special service in which we'll honor this year's RE teachers, highlight the accomplishments of their RE classes over the previous nine months, and celebrate the high school seniors who are moving into adulthood as well as the 20 children and youth (even more than I initially thought!) who are moving up to a new class this year. Look forward to seeing you then.

Fresh Bucks in this third season. Last year more than 4,000 participants used Fresh Bucks receiving \$99,000 that not only purchases fresh food but benefits the farm economy as well.

Phinney/Greenwood Farmer's Market started Friday, May 29.



## Signature Gathering for Three Citizen Initiatives

Different Social Action Ministry members are gathering signatures for three different citizen initiatives after Sunday Services.



### WA STATE CARBON TAX INITIATIVE (I-732).

We are approaching 100 congregant signatures for this state initiative addressing a major driving factor for global climate change—CO2 emissions. We will probably not continue seeking more signatures after May 31. However, if you are a registered Washington voter and would like to sign, please contact Jo Moore or Bob Beekman during our after-church coffee time on ANY Sunday. If you would like to get more involved by gathering signatures yourself for this initiative—at grocery stores, farmers' markets, street fairs, etc—tell Jo or Bob or go on-line to <http://carbonwa.org/signature-gathering/>. There may be a Sno-King launch/training event in June if the campaign gets enough early volunteers from North Seattle, Shoreline, Mountlake Terrace, Lynnwood, Edmonds, Bothell, and Woodinville.

### WA STATE GET BIG MONEY OUT OF ELECTIONS INITIATIVE (I-735).

This initiative is a retry of last year's I-1329, which did not qualify for the ballot. It urges the WA State Congressional delegation to propose an amendment to the U.S. Constitution stating that constitutional rights belong only to individuals and not corporations or associations; that spending money is not considered free speech under the First Amendment, that governments may regulate political contributions and expenditures, and that such contributions and expenditures must be disclosed to the public. Cheryl Whitcomb will be collecting signatures and recruiting signature gatherers in the church entry hall after Sunday services. **HONEST ELECTIONS SEATTLE CITY INITIATIVE (I-122).** Bill Roach is collecting signatures of registered Seattle City voters for this initiative, which would enact various Seattle City election campaign finance regulations. The most interesting provision in this initiative is for the City of Seattle to use public funds to provide each registered Seattle voter with four \$25 dollar vouchers to donate as he or she chooses to qualified candidates running in city elections.
