## Minister's Message for April

Dear SUUC Family,

*Buen Camino!* Meaning, I hope you are having a good walk through life. I am preparing for my own new journey, walking the Camino de Santiago this fall while on sabbatical. This generous congregation provides me with six months of sabbatical for every six years I serve as your minister--thank you! My sabbatical begins on June 17th and ends December 15th. On September 16th I will lead worship at the Paris Fellowship, a congregation of mostly expats in France. Then I plan to travel to Spain to begin walking the pilgrim's path, the Camino de Santiago.

The Camino is also called the Path of Saint James by Catholics, for whom it became a major pilgrimage in the medieval age. Today many of the pilgrim hostels--rooms filled with bunk beds for walkers--are in monasteries or are maintained by monks in churches. But long before the Catholic Church, the route was popular with spiritual seekers walking to Finisterre, the city at the northern tip of Spain that was long thought to be the very edge of the world. In fact, on a clear night the very Milky Way seems to outline the path above the trail. For thousands of years people have walked through the mountains and villages of Northern Spain communing with nature and living in awe.




As many of you know I had ankle surgery last fall, so while I hope to walk all 500 miles of the Camino, from the border of France to Santiago, I am staying flexible as to how my journey will proceed. Perhaps I will travel some of the route by bicycle, or on horseback. While I walk I will meditate, seeking the Divine in silence. By night I will sleep in hostels, surrounded by pilgrims from all over the world. Last year over 200,000 people walked the Camino! I just hope my snoring won't keep too many of them awake.

I have many months before I begin my Camino journey, but I hope you will hold me in your hearts as I prepare. While on the path I plan to walk around fifteen miles a day, for around thirty-five days, so my physical training has already begun. I will travel with you in my heart as I train and while in Spain.

May your journey this month be sweet!

## Director of Religious Exploration

Hello and a happy beginning of spring to you all! There's been a whole lot happening around the church in the past few weeks and a lot more happening in the coming months. Obviously, the biggest thing on everyone's mind is the fact that we're now occupying the new building for children's classes and coffee hour each Sunday morning. It's had a great effect on attendance already - after a winter of significantly lower RE attendance, March has seen a big increase in the total number of kids and youth coming on Sundays. It's been great to get settled into the building, see how the different areas are already being utilized before and after the service, and watch children and adults alike get to know and enjoy our new gathering spaces.



This month the 4th-5th grade Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality education program will wrap up on the 22nd, marking the end of their seven sessions together learning about bodies, puberty, gender, peer pressure, and how our values as UUs relate to the choices and actions we make in these areas. Thanks to everyone for making our first year so successful - a dozen kids have attended the program. I look forward to offering it again in two years (we alternate offering K-2nd and 7th-9th grade OWL on odd years and 4th-5th grade OWL in even years).

This day will also be special in that there will be an SUUC sponsored family hike and picnic! Here's some information about it from Kellie Moore who has graciously agreed to organize and host the event:

Please join us for a family hike at St. Edwards park in Kenmore on April 22nd. We will meet by the playground at 2:30 p.m. and hike down to the lake. The hike is approximately 2 miles and suitable for most ages, although the climb down to the lake has a few steep spots. Bring snacks and water and a sense of adventure! In addition to this event, we'll also be hosting a family lunch and picnic at Twin Ponds Park after the service on June 3. Jennifer Doherty offered me the wise chestnut that potlucks are often hard for little kids/picky eaters so we're going to keep the event simple: sandwiches will be provided, you bring snacks and drinks.

There's a lot more going on; the kindergarten-2nd graders helped move rocks to make the stream bed along the path behind the new building, the 3rd-5th graders have been working to raise money for the Rainforest Fund and learning about the issues around immigration in the USA, the 6th-8th grade group has been talking about our UU martyrs (stay tuned for more on that), and our youth group has been exploring how our values and highest aspirations relate to how we interact with social media. ## Side by Side... a column from Mental Health & Recovery Ministries

This month's column will continue our introduction to the 12 Steps. Step Four states:  
***Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.***

Hi, I'm Kate and I'm an alcoholic. When I first started going to AA meetings, the group I attended had the 12 Steps in giant print posted on the wall behind the head of the table. I couldn't imagine myself ever being able to complete this daunting list and in actuality, it did take me a very long time to do so.

At first, Step 4 was super scary to me. I read it as though I was supposed to look at all my moral failings, put them on a list and then someone else was going to shame and verbally beat me up for them. Well, thankfully, it doesn't work that way!

In my experience, the purpose of step four is to slow down, get clear on your positive attributes and your less positive qualities. I've found that it's impossible to \*will\* myself into being a better person but when I dig down and really look at my behaviors and see the whole picture from an earnest desire to learn what's behind the behavior, I have the opportunity to learn and change. I found out that some of what I labeled as my

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worst qualities were actually a coping mechanism from my chaotic childhood or were an ill attempt at self-care that didn't really serve me any longer.

Doing an inventory is not about beating yourself up yet again, it's about being real and being honest. I spent so much time and energy trying to protect myself, I really believed, "if you really knew me, you wouldn't like me." I had decades of shame and fear. I believed I was a horrible, no-good person. When I actually finally did my fourth step, I was able to see that I had tremendous value and my good qualities far outweighed my bad and that if I focused more on the good, the rest would gently fade away in the remaining steps.

Now, 20 plus years into this adventure, I genuinely look forward to seeing what my part is and what I can learn from it. I don't instantly start beating myself up and feeling shame. I'm now able to look at most "bad" interactions with a sense of curiosity about what I could have done better to have more peace and joy.

Keep coming back, it really does get better.

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## **April 1: "Easter and Jesus for Everyone: Including Atheists and Nones"**

In the first century of our era there was a human being who was called Divine, Son of God, God, God from God and given the titles of Lord, Redeemer, Liberator, and Savior of the World (Crossan, 2007). He was born Gaius Octavius and ruled as the first emperor of the Roman Empire from 27 bce to 14 ce. Within 30 years of his death another man was given all these names and titles--only this man was at the bottom of the Roman Empire, a homeless, counter-cultural sage who wandered in the Israelite villages of northern Galilee with a store of enigmatic sayings and parables that earned him a place at dinner tables. His admirers took the names and titles of the Roman emperor and gave them to this Israelite peasant. To the Romans it was treason.

He was destined to become the greatest Superhero of the Greco-Roman world--but before that he was a simple man, poor (on purpose), homeless (on purpose) going from house to house with stories of a new Empire in which there was no longer male and female, Jew and Alien, Greek and Barbarian, slave and free, rich and poor, an Empire of Goodness that anyone could enter, any day, any time.

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The purpose of the Easter service on April 1 is to bring this man back from the dead. And ask: What might he have to say to UUs (who often have little time for him) about living under the Trumpian Occupation of the USA. The language and content of the service are designed especially for atheists and the non-religious. If that describes a family member or friends, it is a good opportunity to invite them to join you in one of your favorite things.

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## Minutes for the March 6 SUUC Board of Trustees Meeting

Attending: Carolyn Threadgill, Judi Kalitzki, Paul Borrmann, Ryan Dunne, Catherine Crain, Juel Erickson, Rev. Kate and Bill Hayes

The meeting opened at 7:05 p.m.

The minutes of the February 6, 2018 meeting were unanimously approved

### New Business

1. Paul presented his financial report. He suggested that we hold off spending money. The new building is costing more than projected. We will need additional pledges. Also, projections for the fall stewardship campaign are looking tough. We fell short last year, and only met our goal for compensation increases by using more reserves for the new building loan repayments. We will need at least \$15,000 more in revenue than last year just for the compensation increases and a portion of the building loan payments. The Music Committee has requested an additional \$300 for sheet music. Much of our sheet music has been photocopied, which is illegal. The Board voted and approved the additional \$300. The Music Committee also re-

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requested approval for a fundraising campaign in the fall to raise money for new hymnals. Church members will be able to purchase a hymnal in honor of a loved one. The Welcome Team requested additional funds for their 2018 budget. There is some confusion as to where the coffee money is counted. The welcome team was counting on that to make up their budget, but their budget line item states \$1,000. They are requesting a total of \$1,600. The Board agreed to add this discussion to the agenda for next month's meeting. The Endowment Committee has reviewed and approved the withdrawal of 70% of the 2017 endowment income from the SEE Fund to transfer to the SUUC checking account for use in the 2018 operating budget, equal to the amount of \$2606.15.


2. It was suggested and approved by the Board to move \$10,000 from undesignated funds, (leaving \$22,000 available), for major repairs, specifically, for a new roof on the Dome.
3. The Congregational Life Committee status and proposed fair will be on the agenda for the April meeting.
4. Catherine presented an update on the sabbatical plans, specifically the search process for an interim minister. The ad has been published. We have received 1 application and 2 inquiries. The search committee consists of Barbara Cornell, Bill Hayes, Catherine Crain and Rev. Kate. It was discussed and agreed that the committee will present the top 3 candidates to the Board for discussion and final selection. We also felt we needed one or two more members on this committee. Catherine will investigate. The time line for the selection: the closing date for applications is Mar 19. By the April Board meeting we should have 3 candidates interviewed and references checked.
5. We agreed that both the Personnel and Rentals Committees need more members. The Board liaisons will contact those committees and explore options for expanding them. Catherine is liaison for the Rentals Committee and Carolyn is liaison for the Personnel Committee.
6. Wil Sederholm, our new Choir Director, is working 9 hours a week and is willing to work 12 hours a week if and when SUUC wishes to extend his hours. His current contract with us is open-ended, and he would like it to be made a permanent contract. It was moved and approved to make his contract a permanent one. He will remain at 9 hours per week and \$23 an hour.

Meeting adjourned shortly after 9 p.m.




## **SUUC WOMEN'S GROUP WILL MEET ON SATURDAY, APRIL 7 FROM 10 A.M. TO NOON**
