Now our project is put on the builder's official schedule, prompting them to begin the formal design plans. In about a month we will see those plans, and I will post them in the church foyer. At the same time, our civil engineer is working up the formal site plans. At the present time, I figure we will start demolition and excavation in June, based on those site plans. The modular building may come on site in August, if all goes well. We should expect delays and surprises along the way, and we will work our way through each one as it occurs. Thanks, everyone, for your confidence in the process and your patience. We will get there!

Hello all! It's been another big month in our church community – we had another record breaking day on February 19, with 49 kids at church on Sunday and another nine attending youth group that evening, for a total of 58 kids coming for our kids' programs this Sunday! Our previous record Sunday for RE attendance was 48, so this one tops it, and by a whole lot! A big part of this great phenomenon can be attributed to this Sunday being the first day of our K-2nd Our Whole Lives (or "OWL") sexuality education program which was led by Corinne Sherry and me. It was a whole lot of fun to see the kids go from slightly nervous about what the day would hold for them to having lots of fun and engaging thoughtfully with the material on the topic of the day, which was "Our Wonderful Bodies."

I want to take a moment to draw attention to an event we'll be holding this month – on Sunday, March 19, at noon, we'll be having our now-biannual parent orientation to RE session. In this 90-minute event, several members of our church and I will talk about the scope of our Religious Exploration program, our vision and goals for the children and youth who go through the program, and ways in which parents can help encourage their children's spiritual growth. I know that everyone comes to our church looking for something slightly different for themselves and their families so there will be time during this event for you all to share your hopes and dreams for your children with the group so that we can ensure our RE program, like our faith, as a whole, grows and changes over time to reflect our members. Though this event is mainly intended for folks who are newer to the church, anyone and everyone is welcome to attend! We will have childcare available as well as some light snacks for grown-ups and kids alike. Please join the 30 other folks at SUUC who have attended the parent orientation and help to support the religious exploration of your children and the children of the wider community. Oh, and I'll be in the pulpit for the first time March 19, so that's something else to look forward to as well!

Last, given the roaring success of OWL program for both the 7th-9th grade and the K-2nd grade classes, I'm hoping to put on OWL for 4th-5th graders next year. While I'm trained to lead this program, it's proven somewhat challenging to be in charge of a class on Sunday morning and act in my usual capacities as Director of Religious Exploration. Finding subs, greeting and quickly orienting newcomers, and helping teachers with last minute needs can't really happen when I'm busy with a classroom from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.! If you are interested in knowing more about what leading the 4th-5th grade OWL program would look like and attending a weekend training at some point in the next year, please let me know!

OK, that's all for now. I look forward to seeing all of you on Sunday, and hopefully outside of Sunday as well!




Money Talks

ALWAYS--There Are Challenges Ahead

Many of you wonder just how SUUC is doing financially. The most accurate short answer to that is “we are doing quite well.” We are paying our bills, increasing our staff compensation annually, getting ready to put up our new building--and we have built some reserves so that unexpected demands on us will not overwhelm us.

But there are some major items that are facing the Board in the months ahead. In the next couple of months, I will talk about a few of them. One issue is the increased burden our growth has placed on our administrative staff. Another is the maintenance needs for our dome, and a third is the need to plan for the sabbatical our minister is entitled to take sometime in the next two-three years. This month I focus on the administrative staffing issue; the others will be addressed in this

column over the next two months.

The growth of our congregation, both in membership and in complexity, has placed increased demands on our Administrator. The 26 hours per week budgeted for the position has become insufficient, and the Board has directed the Personnel Committee to come up with a plan to resolve the issue. In the interim, the Board approved an additional 4 hours per week. The resolution of this issue, whatever it may be, will certainly require increases in the annual budget for administrative staffing. To give you a sense of how much that might cost, that 4 hour-per-week increase would mean an annual increase of \$5,000. The longer-term plan may well cost more than that, especially since a part of the solution will likely involve the need to pay for some “tech” help that could be immediately available to troubleshoot problems that arise in our increasingly technology-dependent office world.

As we are about to see our new building appear next to the Dome, this challenge-- and the others I will address in the coming months--make it prudent for us to seek additional capital pledges for the new building project. The more we can raise in member pledges for that project, the less we will need to borrow--and the more that will be available in the annual operating budget to meet the challenges we face.

Minutes from February Board Meeting

Attending: Carolyn, Paul, Mandy, Juel, Judi, Ali, and Kate Landis

January Board meeting minutes were approved.

To help new members feel part of the community and receive more information on the how and why of the new building, Paul Borrmann, Rev. Kate, Juel Erickson, Judi Kalitzki, and Carolyn Threadgill set up house meetings for 2/11, 2/12, and 2/22 (with the help of Karen Thompson). The Board discussed details and logistics of these meetings.

Also discussed was an update from Paul that the Davis/Parnassus fund was able to contribute more money to the new building fund than initially expected (\$140,000 instead of \$135,000). It has been moved to our savings account to protect it for the building from market swings. At the time of the Board meeting, the new building had \$508,000 in pledges on the books, bringing the total expected money for the new building to \$898,000.

Carolyn gave an update on the status of approvals, permits, and contracts. At the time of the Board meeting, she was re-budgeting for a trench drainage system instead of the rain gardens we had planned.

Based on the status of contracts and permits, we will not need to have the anticipated congregational meeting on February 19th to discuss further budgeting.

Congregational Life Task Force update (Ali): The first meeting of the task force was scheduled for 2/12. Task Force members include Alison Lilly, Anne Maxwell, Noel Bain, Rick Wilson. Other members have expressed interest and the group may be larger.

The Board discussed some of the challenges facing our SUUC administrator in regards to adequate hours for necessary job functions. The Board moved to approve an increase of 4 paid hours per week to Laurie Radin (current administrator) for a period of 2 months while the personnel committee and minister investigate a long-term solution to growing administrator responsibilities and hours. This was unanimously approved.

Discussion included tasks being done by the administrator previously done by volunteers or that could be done by volunteers, and the impact of recent and future IT needs on the administrator's abilities and time.

At the request of one of the staff members, the Board reviewed the current Rental Policy in regards to staff use of space at reduced rental fees. The board recommended that staff be allowed to schedule non-SUUC sponsored events for a custodial fee if the space is unscheduled 7-days prior to the planned date. As the liaison to the Rental Committee, Allison Lilly will discuss with them an update to the policy and any recommendations the committee might have.

The Committee on Ministry is planning to develop a process for regular performance reviews of the Minister. There is believed to be language in the Minister's contract regarding the timing of such reviews and the COM will work with the Board and UUA to help further clarify and define a review process. Previously the Minister was evaluated based on the schedule to receive full fellowship which Rev. Kate achieved last year.

Further updates on the status of the new building: timing of when the building will be built is very dependent on a number of decisions that are actively being done by the city and our contracted civil engineer and the modular builder. Carolyn Threadgill is following details very closely and at the time of the Board meeting expected no more than 2 weeks before bids could be sought and we could sign the contract to get on the builder's schedule. At this time, the New Building Committee expects us to occupy the current Chrysalis building through the end of April, and still have the new building in place before the end of 2017.

Thank you notes were sent to Ed Buzzell for joining the New Building Committee and offering his considerable expertise as a retired construction manager; Laurie Radin for all the extra hours she has put in to keep up with church needs for administrative services; Fred and Betsy Cray, for their generous donation of furnishings and beautiful plant for the new building from their publishing firm.

Side by Side...a column from Mental Health Ministry



This year I've devoted this column to gifts we all can give to those who struggle with mental illness or addiction. This month the gift is knowledge. There are many ways we can gain and expand our knowledge of mental illness. In the mental health world, there seem to be two major points of view. First, there's the medical model. You can read about that at the National Alliance of the Mentally Ill (NAMI) website: www.NAMI.org and National Institutes of Mental Health (NIMH): www.NIMH.gov. There are tons of articles and conferences and workshops available. The other model is a collection of groups seeking alternatives. An introduction to this perspective can be found in a book by Robert Whitaker entitled *Anatomy of an Epidemic*. There are several organiza-

tions that are working on alternatives, for instance, the Hearing Voices Network: <https://www.hearing-voices.org/> Western Mass (as in Massachusetts) Recovery Learning Community: <http://www.westernmassrlc.org/> and The Icarus Project: <http://theicarusproject.net/>. Like the NAMI and NIMH websites, these websites are full of articles and many resources. I've appreciated the variety of approaches illuminated in podcasts from Madness Radio: www.madnessradio.net

You might appreciate the first person accounts of mental illness from authors Kay Redfield Jamison (a therapist with mental illness) and Mark Vonnegut (an MD with mental illness). They each have a few books that are excellent. What books have you appreciated most? I'd love to hear your favorites. Oh, there is so much to learn. Like so much in life, there isn't just one way to respond to a mental health challenge. I believe community, people who know us, and love us are absolutely central to surviving with a mental illness. The most important thing to remember as you are learning is to be sure to share what you are learning with others, so that together we can widen the circle of understanding and compassion.

MARCH HYMN OF THE MONTH



Each month the Music Committee chooses a hymn from our rich and varied heritage. This month's hymn, #119, "Once to Every Soul and Nation," speaks to this month's theme of Good and Evil. The text is adapted from a poem by James Russell Lowell, protesting the war with Mexico in the 1840s. Lowell was a Unitarian cleric, a professor at Harvard University, and the first editor of the *Atlantic Monthly*. The tune, "Ebenezer," by Welsh composer Thomas John Williams, was for many years called "Ton-y-Botel," from a story alleging it had been found in a bottle on the beach. The distinctive tune, with its martial beat and shifts from major to minor, has been used in many orchestral and organ compositions.

HOW TO BE AN EFFECTIVE VOICE FOR TRUTH, JUSTICE, AND TOLERANCE.

Upset by political events in our country? You can do something! Join an advocacy group for the issue or problem you care about most and then write or call your elected government officials. The successful Washington State lawsuit that halted Trump's initial anti-Muslim immigration ban shows the power of state governments to influence even national policy and actions. The resignation of Trump's first National Security Advisor, Michael Flynn, after persistent news stories by the Washington Post about his contacts with Russian officials before the inauguration, illustrates the importance of truth seeking and truth telling by independent and vigorous news organizations.

FILM ON NUCLEAR DANGER, MARCH 11.



With the danger of nuclear accident or exchange still with us almost 30 years after the Cold War ended, Sno-King Meaningful Movies will show **COMMAND AND CONTROL**, a chilling minute-by-minute account of a near catastrophic nuclear explosion at a Titan II Missile complex after a worker drops a socket and punctures a missile's fuel tank.

The screening will be on Saturday, March 11th at 7 p.m. at the Edmonds Unitarian Universalist Congregation, 8109 224th St. SW, Edmonds. Discussion will follow with special guests Doris Fulton of Snohomish Peace Action, and Mary Hanson, of Ground Zero. Both organizations are part of the Washington Coalition to Stop the New Nuclear Arms Race. Washington is particularly vulnerable, especially with the Trident Submarine base in Bangor and the Hanford Nuclear Reservation on the Columbia River.

This documentary film tells the long-hidden story of a deadly accident at a Titan II missile complex in Damascus, Arkansas in 1980. Based on the critically-acclaimed book by Eric Schlosser, this chilling reconstruction exposes the terrifying truth about the management of America's nuclear arsenal.

Following the film, we will hold a discussion and hear from our special guests. Doors open at 6:30 p.m. for conversation and refreshments, film begins at 7.
