

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## Director of Religious Exploration

Have you ever used one of those emergency radios? It's basically like a radio that doesn't need batteries; you can use a crank to wind it up by hand. Of course, if you want to listen to the radio for more than a couple seconds, you have to turn that crank for a **long** time! I often feel like I'm "winding the crank" on the Religious Exploration program in the months of August --there's a lot of teacher recruitment, classroom meetings, fitting together very different schedules, planning sessions, purchasing supplies, running of background checks, and a whole host of tasks associated with getting the program started. But in just a couple short weeks, the RE machine will be fully charged up and we can hit the "on" switch. Children and youth of our church, along with the adults who have agreed to spend time with them this year, will have the opportunity to explore the deepest questions of life, to laugh, to bond, to learn, and to create a community that will sustain them throughout this year and many, many years to come.



While I have an outsized role in the RE program at this time of year, pulling together the various strands that will make our RE program run smoothly and sustainably for the coming year, much of the journey ahead will be facilitated by the team of teachers who I previously mentioned. We have a great mix of folks this year, with almost exactly half of the teachers being new to RE this year and the other half returning from last year's RE classes. Between the five regular classes, we've got 19 folks teaching this year, which is seven less than last year. We've been able to reduce the number of RE volunteers needed to run our program by ending the regular RE year a couple weeks earlier than usual and increasing the number of Sundays RE teachers volunteer by a couple weeks as well. I'm really looking forward to seeing how the year will go differently when teachers and children / youth get to spend more time together over the course of the year and don't go for such long stretches without seeing each other! I'm also very excited to work with this year's RE teachers – so you can congratulate and thank

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them the next time you see them. Here's a list of everyone who is helping in the RE program this year:

Also, leading up our church's Coming of Age program for 9th-11th graders will be Kim Hayes, Amanda Ray, and myself.

If you feel remiss in not raising your hand to help with the kids' program before we got everyone we needed for the year, or if you wanted to help but couldn't commit to the full year, we *do* still have a couple spots where you may find you fit in to the program. First, we can always use **subs**. Sometimes people need a day off and the other folks in the class can't cover it (which may be more of an issue this year with our leaner sized teaching teams!) and having folks on hand to help on short notice is always very appreciated. Second, those three classes I mentioned cutting out from the end of the RE year will still be Sundays in which we'll have offerings for kids on Sunday morning--but we won't have the normal teaching team to lead them. For these Sundays and other "Children's Church" days in which multiple age groups join together for one class, I can always need a few helpers. Last, there's occasionally complaints from the older kids in the nursery/preschool room that some of the younger kids in the class act like babies...because they are literally babies! =) Since we only have a couple very little ones in this room, it doesn't make sense yet, number-wise, to split the group into two classes. For that reason, I'm starting a new part-time RE position --the "Baby Brigade!" If you like holding little babies and would like some time taking care of a little baby for a bit on Sunday morning so that the preschool group can enjoy some "big kid time," please let me know!

Finally, a quick reminder of one important upcoming event:

**Sunday, September 9, noon-1:30 p.m. – Orientation to Religious Exploration** – This is a regularly offered gathering primarily aimed at families who are new to our church in which congregants and I talk about the goals and vision for our RE program, the scope of what we offer at various ages and stages of children's lives, as well ways you can encourage your child's spiritual development both inside and outside of our church's walls. Childcare offered, RSVPs greatly appreciated!

## Side by Side...a column from Mental Health & Recovery Ministries



This month's column will continue our introduction to the 12 Steps. Step Nine states: **Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.**

My name is Lauren and I am a grateful member of Overeaters Anonymous and Alanon. Each step in AA has a spiritual principle and the spiritual principle for Step 9 is Love. We are repairing and rebuilding relationships with others so that our relationships are based on kindness, compassion and love. In Step 8, we "Made a list of all persons we had harmed and became willing to make amends to them all." The harm we did could have been with words, attitudes or actions. We must be very careful when making amends never to bring up any of what we perceive as the other person's wrongs. This step is about clearing away our past mistakes. Working this step takes humility and courage, but the rewards are more than worth it. It removes our guilt and shame from our past actions and repairs relationships.

Sometimes we must make amends to people we feel have harmed us also. If we still feel resentment towards this person, we "pray" daily that they have everything in their life that I would like to have in mine, such as love, financial security, good health, etc. After repeating this prayer for 30 days, you will often feel differently towards this person and more able to go ahead with your amends. If you can't locate the person to whom you owe amends, or if they have died, you can write down your amends and symbolically give them away. We should always share our amends with a friend (or in my case in OA, with my sponsor) to get feedback. Our amends should not include any excuses (e.g., I was going through a hard time back then). Basically, we say: I did this. I was wrong. I have changed/ am changing/will change my behavior. Living amends means that we change our behavior. This step is about Love--for ourselves and others.

**September 9:** Rev. Amanda will be in the pulpit presenting "A River Flowin' in My Soul." This service is the ritual of Water Communion. Come to church with water from your summer experience, or use the ceremonial water provided, to combine together. This represents our coming together for the seasons of fall, winter and spring. It is an All Ages Service and our plate share this day is Water First International.

**September 16** features the return of congregant Bob Beekman to the pulpit addressing "The Trouble with Meritocracy." Last in the pulpit on 1/7/18, Bob spoke then on "Free Speech Protections for Hate Speech?" His analysis and comprehensive review of the topic gives listeners a strong message.

**September 23:** "Built for This," by Rev. Carmen TenEyck-McDowell. She will speak to our resources, individually and collectively, and how they can serve us when challenges provoke a lack of hope. 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## Minutes of the Board of Trustees Meeting, August 7, 2018

Attending: Judi Kalitzki, Catherine Crain, Dana Doerksen and Juel Erickson

Absent: Bill Hayes, Homer Henderson and Ryan Dunne

The minutes of the July 3, 2018 meeting were unanimously approved

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## *New Business*

1. The Rental Committee requested two changes to the rental policies to better reflect our current practices. The Board approved both.
  - A. Church tax-exempt status requires that the facilities shall not be rented to groups or organizations which do not qualify, i.e. non-profit. The WA State Department of Revenue has listed some exceptions to this rule that will also qualify.
  - B. We can now give a 20% discount to groups meeting monthly or more frequently, who sign a rental agreement.
2. Renee Palermo reports that the current plan for next year's Seabeck retreat will involve just SUUC and Evergreen churches. The last few years have seen more churches added to the retreat, but SUUC did almost all of the work. Because next year's retreat will be smaller, some changes had to be made. Also, we lost the first of May as a date, so our retreat will be the last weekend in April, where it has usually been. We will not have some accommodations available that we have had in the past, but we will have plenty of capacity and should be quite comfortable. She submitted the contract for 80 guests, and Judi has signed it.
3. Ryan was out of town, so no update on the Stewardship Campaign.
4. We discussed the landscaping plan that was adopted last meeting. We still need a budget estimate for the plan. Bill Hayes has agreed to work with Justin Martin to develop a budget and a schedule for the landscaping project. Bruce Hunt submitted a budget request for top soil and hydro seeding for the west and north sides of the building and it was approved. A question was raised about the back fence--we can measure the exact placement of the property line and then come up with a plan to fix and/or move the fence. There are roughly a dozen fence posts stored that might be used for this.
5. Chris Pollina has stated that he will use the \$1175 raised at the auction by Raise the Paddle to purchase blinds for the new classrooms. The Board voted to approve this expenditure.
6. We discussed indications for how the sabbatical is going so far. Attendance has been up for most of the Sundays so far compared to last year at this time. Both Barbara Cornell and Carmen TenEyck-McDowell submitted reports concerning their pastoral care duties. Barbara had 15 distinct pastoral care contacts in July and Carmen has been coordinating and supporting the Pastoral Care Team, who have been about 15-18 people per month. Both Barbara and Carmen feel that the process is working well. Rev. Amanda also submitted a report as well. She organized a couple of meetings, for spiritual and political discussions and is also accepting individual appointments for ministerial consultations. We would like to check in again in October, and also include Worship Planning and Laurie Radin and Chris Polina.
7. The UUA sent a letter to Congregational Presidents requesting feedback on a proposed update to the UUA/UUMA Model Ministerial Agreement. Judi shared the agreement with the board and asked that we read and bring any feedback and/or comments to the September meeting.

Thank you notes were written Renee Palermo for her work on the Seabeck retreat, to Barbara Cornell, Carmen

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TenEyck-McDowell for their Pastoral Care work and to Bronte Anderson, Shelley Anderson, Sarah Crowder, Jasmine Pulido and Celestine West for their work on the Pastoral Care Team.

Meeting adjourned shortly after 9 p.m.

On that day, we will recognize Water First International, which serves families in the world's poorest communities. Water First establishes community-managed projects that integrate water supply, sanitation and health education.


### Pastoral Care in September

### Next Meaningful Movie September 8: *Harvest of Empire*

Sno-King Meaningful Movies' September film is a powerful documentary. This documentary reveals the direct connection between the long history of U.S. intervention in Latin America and the immigration crisis we face today. *Harvest of Empire* takes an unflinching look at the role that U.S. economic and military interests played in triggering an unprecedented wave of migration that is transforming our nation's cultural and economic landscape. From the wars for territorial expansion that gave the U.S. control of Puerto Rico, Cuba and more than half of Mexico, to the covert operations that imposed oppressive military regimes in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Nicaragua and El Salvador, *Harvest of Empire* unveils a moving human story that is largely unknown to the great majority of U.S. citizens. Stephanie Merry wrote this in her review for *The Washington Post*:

*"For all the talk about immigration, rarely does the conversation veer into why so many Latinos have come to the United States. 'Harvest of Empire' attempts to fill in the gaps, and the reasons don't include some naive notion about streets being paved with gold."*

The film provides a rare and powerful glimpse into the enormous sacrifices and rarely-noted triumphs of our nation's growing Latino community and features present day immigrant stories.


